Leading London youth violence charity appoints new CEO

Safer London is delighted to announce the appointment of Rosemary Watt-Wyness as its new Chief Executive Officer. A highly experienced and respected leader in the third sector, Rosemary will officially step into the role on 12th May.

Rosemary brings a wealth of experience spanning service delivery, policy development and strategic leadership. Over the past two decades, she has held senior roles in some of the UK's most impactful charities, championing causes focused on mental health, homelessness and community support.

Prior to joining Safer London, Rosemary served as CEO at London Youth for eight years, leading London's largest network of youth organisations. About Safer London

Safer London works alongside young Londoners and their families whose lives have already been impacted by violence and exploitation. Through specialist, traumainformed one-to-one intervention, we support young Londoners to recover, rebuild and move toward the positive futures they deserve.

Last year we reached **1094** young Londoners and families through all our programmes and support. Safer London caseworkers worked alongside **590** young Londoners, providing specialist and intensive one to one support. Safer London's family caseworkers worked with **61** parents/carers, supporting their wellbeing and increasing their resilience and ability to keep their children safe from harm.

Our work includes:

- **Specialist services for girls and young women**, including those involved in the criminal justice system (CJS), providing tailored support to address the specific challenges they face.
- Specialist support for girls and young women impacted by sexual violence, with dedicated workers offering expert support to those who have experienced sexual violence.
- **Specialist support around harmful sexual behaviours**, delivered through a distinct service that works with all genders, providing targeted intervention for those exhibiting lower to medium levels of harmful sexual behaviours.
- Specialist workers experienced in supporting neurodiverse children and young people, providing tailored interventions to address their unique needs and challenges.
- Delivery of the Mayor of London's VESS London: The Safe Place service, supporting young Londoners and families impacted by violence and exploitation.
- Award-winning programmes, including Beyond the Banter, recognised for their innovative approaches.
